Programme Overview

Brief outline of the programme

Southampton Law School has a long-standing tradition and a global reputation for its LLM Maritime Law. This exceptional programme gives you the practical know-how and theoretical knowledge of the key areas of maritime law, upon which you can successfully build a legal career in the maritime sector. Given the essential role of shipping to global trade, maritime law practice remains a strong legal sector that offers a good range of possible careers. Southampton - as a quintessential port city and being home to numerous shipping industry organisations - offers the ideal background for your studies.

Having intensively studied the law on the carriage of goods by sea, marine insurance, admiralty law, arbitration law, the international law of the sea or other related subjects, you will be able to tackle complex legal issues arising from practical scenarios. The programme also develops your practical transferable skills, including the ability to conduct independent research, both online and offline, time management, verbal and written communication, presenting and planning.

The LLM Maritime Law programme aims to develop your legal skills within a structure that allows you to shape your degree towards those areas in which you have a particular interests, while maintaining an overall coherence in relation to your individual choice of modules.

Your contact hours will be eight hours per week and will consist of seminars, or lectures and seminars, depending on the module. As a postgraduate, you will be expected to devote many hours to independent study as preparation for those contact hours and in working on your assignments and dissertation.

The LLM Maritime Law draws on the research strengths of the School's academic staff who are active at the cutting edge of international and national legal reform and development. The expertise of the staff has been recognised as being of international excellence, and in the School of Law we are strongly committed to providing the very best learning experience for all our students in a friendly, stimulating and research-led environment.

Your contact hours will vary depending on your module/option choices. Full information about contact hours is provided in individual module profiles.

Learning and teaching

The programme is taught through a combination of lectures and/or seminars and through guided independent study in order to develop your skills of analysis of relevant legal materials, the identification of the key legal and policy issues, and the appraisal of solutions available. In the seminars and lectures you will develop clarity and objectivity in the application of legal principles, and the critical appraisal of law. These skills will be further developed through the production of written work (assessed and non-assessed), written feedback and later through collaboration with dissertation supervisors during the dissertation drafting.

Assessment

Formal examinations and assignments will assess students' abilities in relation to the learning outcomes of the LLM Programme, as far as written discussion is concerned. Furthermore, the dissertation will give students the opportunity to bring together all of the skills developed and acquired throughout the programme.

Special Features of the programme

The Southampton Law School is home to the renowned Institute of Maritime Law. Members of the Institute are at the forefront of maritime law and bring their expertise to bear in the delivery of the LLM Maritime Law. The Institute runs a Practitioner Seminar programme in which eminent speakers from the shipping and maritime industry come and deliver lectures and seminars on a wide range of topics. This provides an exceptional opportunity for you to speak to, learn from and network with practitioners in the field.

The postgraduate cohort of Southampton Law School has always been very international, with students studying with us from many corners of the world. We take account of the fact that many of our LLM students do not come from a common law legal systems and other students have a lot of relevant industry or practical experience but do not have a law degree. Therefore, we allocate the first week in each new academic year to run an intensive legal skills programme, called Introduction to Legal Skills, that introduces you to the common law system, the interactions of statute and judge-made law as well as the impact of international conventions and model laws on national law. During this week, you will also be introduced to the law library and the extensive electronic legal databases and other resources we hold. The programme will provide you with the foundations for taking the specialised modules.

Southampton Law School also organises an annual debating competition, the LLM Challenge, where eight teams of postgraduates compete against each other on a diverse range of current legal topics. This competition is popular and each year we award a prize and certificates for the best team.

The aims of the programme are to: The LLM Maritime Law programme aims to develop your legal skills within a structure that will allow you to shape your degree towards those areas in which your interests match our particular expertise, while maintaining an overall coherence in relation to your individual choice of modules.

The aims of the programme are to:

- give you a thorough and systematic knowledge and understanding of the main principles in maritime and related commercial law and their underlying social and economic policies and values;
- give you a critical understanding of the process by which maritime and related commercial law is produced;
- give you an understanding of how national and international law interact generally and in the maritime law context in particular;
- provide you with experience in dealing with legal principles deriving from a variety of legal instruments, including, where appropriate, international conventions, statutes, case law and standard form contracts;
- enable you to develop skills of legal analysis and problem solving, both systematically and at an advanced level;
- give you a (consolidated) understanding of the workings of the common law system generally and in the maritime law context in particular ;
- give you a critical understanding of legal and policy matters of contemporary controversy.

Teaching and Learning Methods

The knowledge and understanding is acquired through the seminars and lectures and the independent study in preparation for seminars (A1-3). Understanding and knowledge of specific legal area within

maritime or related commercial law is acquired through the research required for the Dissertation (A4).

Assessment Methods

Knowledge and understanding is assessed through a combination of:

The written examinations and course work in the case of the taught modules which will assess A1-3 ;
The Dissertation concentrates on assessing A4 but will also reflect elements of A1-3.

Subject Specific Intellectual and Research Skills

On successful completion of this programme you will be able to:

- B1. Source, interpret and analyse relevant legal materials, including, where appropriate, international conventions, statutes, case law, soft law or standard form contracts.
- B2. Identify, evaluate and apply key legal principles in solving complex practical problems.
- B3. Identify and critically evaluate key legal and policy issues in their social and economic contexts and possible policy responses.
- B4. Communicate legal arguments and opinions within the context of maritime and related commercial law clearly, accurately and objectively.
- B5. Produce an extensive written discussion that coherently communicates an argument on a specific subject-matter on maritime or related commercial law.

Teaching and Learning Methods

Seminars and lecture and guided independent study will develop your skills of analysis of relevant legal materials, the identification of the key legal and legal and policy issues and the appraisal of solutions available (B1,B2,B3). In the seminars you will also initially develop the skill of communicating legal arguments with clarity and objectivity (B4). These skills will be further developed through your production of written work (assessed and non-assessed), written feedback and later through collaboration with your dissertation supervisor (B1-B4).

Assessment Methods

Formal examinations and assignments will assess your abilities in relation to B1-B4, with varying emphasis on the practical application of the law (B2) or critical evaluation of legal and policy issues (B3). The Dissertation particularly assesses B5 but will also reflect skills in B1-B4.

Transferable and Generic Skills

On successful completion of this programme you will be able to:

- C1. Undertake independent research and access primary and secondary sources effectively.
- C2. Analyse complex written texts and evaluate different types of arguments.
- C3. Construct arguments and solve problems, including under time pressure, based on premises drawn from various source.

C4. Communicate arguments in writing and reference sources appropriately.

Teaching and Learning Methods

Independent, supervised research during dissertations and assignments and preparatory research for seminars will be the major teaching methods for C1-C4. Seminar group work will assist in developing your ability to discuss and present the issues under study.

Assessment Methods

All of the above skills are all assessed through the summative assessments, whether in the form of examinations, course work or the final dissertation. The dissertation also show-casts your ability to undertake independent supervised research, analyse complex tests, construct arguments and communicate these effectively.

Part I

The Southampton LLM Maritime Law experience offers a focused programme through which you can tailor your studies to your own interests and career development. You will be given a range of maritime law modules including Carriage of Goods by Sea, International Sale of Goods and Finance, Admiralty Law and Marine Insurance. In addition the School offers other highly relevant modules from which you can choose, including Commercial Arbitration, Commercial Conflict of Laws or Business Finance.

The programme consists of a taught element and a Dissertation. The Dissertation module is worth 30ECTS/60CATS and is Core which means that you must pass it to be awarded the LLM.

The programme can be studied either full-time over 12 months or part-time over 24 months. For full-time study you will complete the taught modules between October and June and then you will complete a supervised dissertation on a topic of your choice between June and September. For part-time study you will generally take 30 ECTS (60 CATS) in each year and also complete a supervised dissertation on a topic of your choice in your second year.

It should be noted that the running of any option module within the programme depends on availability of staff and occasionally some modules may not be offered.

You must select between 45ECTS/90CATS and 60\ECTS/120CATS from the following groups of option modules. You must ensure that you choose an equal balance of credits across the year.

Please note that the structure for part time study will be that students choose their option modules to balance evenly across each semester and each year of study, and complete the core dissertation module in year 2. It should be noted that the running of any option module within the programme depends on availability of staff and occasionally some modules may not be offered.

Support for student learning
