## **Programme**

The workshop will bring together scholars from the US, UK, and Turkey to explore constitutivism, its historical roots, and contemporary prospects. 'Constitutivism' holds that we can justify fundamental normative claims by showing that agents implicitly commit themselves to these claims merely in virtue of acting. How, if at all, can normativity be grounded in the structural features of agency? What must agency be like if it is to support normative grounding? The workshop seeks to explore contemporary approaches to this topic, as well as its historical roots in the work of Kant and others.
